### **Objective:**

To promote the principles of equity and inclusive education, free of barriers and discriminatory biases.

### **Policy Statement:**

The Grand Erie District School Board (Grand Erie) recognizes that equity of access to the full range of programs, services, and resources is critical to positive learning, well-being and belonging outcomes for those served by the school system. Grand Erie is committed to fostering an anti-oppressive, anti-racist, and inclusive culture.

Grand Erie is committed to listening, responding and engaging with communities to ensure all voices feel heard and a part of the process. To that end, Grand Erie shall implement strategies in accordance with the Ontario Education Equity Action Plan to ensure a culturally responsive environment and a culturally safe space to work and learn.

REPORTING OF WRONGDOING

### **Objective:**

To ensure ethical and professional conduct at the Grand Erie District School Board (Grand Erie) and to demonstrate a commitment to maintaining and enhancing public confidence in the integrity of its employees; to ensure protection against reprisal related to reporting of suspected wrongdoing.

### **Policy Statement:**

Grand Erie is committed to ensuring that its actions and operations are performed, with transparency, to the extent permitted by law, accountability, honesty, and integrity.

This imposes a duty on every Grand Erie employee(s), independent contractor, agent and volunteer to Report, in confidence, any reasonable knowledge or suspicion of wrongdoing as defined herein. If warranted, the alleged wrongdoing will be investigated, and appropriate action will be taken on the report of the investigation. This is also available without obligation, to anyone, and in particular students of Grand Erie, past or present, who believe they have been victim to sexual misconduct by a Grand Erie employee(s) or volunteer.

This establishes that any person or legal entity reporting any wrongdoing reasonably and in good faith, ("Reporting Party") shall not be subject to any reprisal as defined herein.

For greater clarity, the role and relationships between the Grand Erie and the Reporting Party shall not, in any way be adversely affected by any Report made reasonably and in good faith.

The Reporting of suspected Wrongdoing of Trustees of the Board is not included by this Policy. Trustee Code of Conduct – Governance Policy #4, applies in those circumstances.

### **Definitions:**

### 1.0 Wrongdoing

- Any action or inaction, past, present, or intended by a Grand Erie employee, independent contractor, agent and volunteer which is contrary or prohibited by any Federal or Provincial Legislation, or Regulations enacted thereunder, Common Law, or Municipal By-law.
- It also includes but is not limited to:
  - Professional Misconduct as defined by relevant Professional Organizations
  - Intentional breach of Grand Erie's Policies, By-Law, and Procedures
  - Instructing, counselling or extorting anyone to commit an act of wrongdoing
  - Statutory or Common Law Conflicts of Interest
  - Mismanagement or maladministration of Board operations
  - Dishonest or unethical behaviour
  - Sexual misconduct of any nature or description

### 2.0 Reprisal

 Any action, inaction or threat of any such action or inaction against a Reporting Party by reason of a Report, including but not limited to:

- Working conditions
- Legal relationship with Grand Erie
- Discipline
- Threats, intimidation or bullying

### 1. Background Rationale

- 1.1. Each Friday the 13th in Port Dover, there is a community event where, in warm weather, extremely high numbers of motorcyclists visit the community for the weekend, arriving in town on or before the 13<sup>th</sup>. Their presence in the community can impact our students significantly. Such an event during warmer months is likely to be very well attended. Such an event in colder months will have much less impact on school operations.
- 1.2. In warm weather, access to the schools is severely limited by traffic, as streets are jammed and access to the town is restricted by the Norfolk O.P.P. Issues of safety in traveling to and from school on Friday the 13th are important considerations for our students, their families and our staff. Staff members who reside in town have indicated that staying in their community that day is better than leaving Port Dover and trying to return later in the day. During the colder months, travel is not impacted as significantly.
- 1.3. On previous warm-weather Friday the 13th days, the Board has closed Lakewood Elementary School to students. The staff has reported to school for PD and program activities. On previous cold-weather Friday the 13th days, the Board has kept the school
- 1.4. For secondary students living in Port Dover, and attending school at Holy Trinity, Simcoe Composite School and Waterford District High School, group stops were organized outside of town limits on warm-weather Friday the 13<sup>th</sup> days. During colder months, when transportation runs normally, these special arrangements are not
- 1.5. There is one Friday the 13th event during the 2023-24 school year: October 13, 2023

### 2. Options Considered

- 2.1. Option Lakewood Elementary School Remains Open to Students/Transportation Runs in Port Dover:
  - This is the usual option for cold-weather Friday the 13th events.
- 2.2. Option Two Cancel Transportation in Port Dover/Lakewood Elementary School Closed to Students/Lakewood Staff Reports to School/Group Stops for Secondary

This is the usual option for warm-weather Friday the 13th events; October 13 would be considered a warm-weather date.

### **Background**

Paris District High School (PDHS) is currently home to approximately 850 Grand Erie students and possesses a 90% space utilization rate. However, the current track, which has served the student population well over its useful life, is beginning to lose its functionality and the school and community are seeking an upgrade. The list of inadequacies/restrictions that the current track presents are as follows:

- The current format of the track has only four lanes. With the closure of Lion's Park in Brantford, PDHS has been receiving requests from elementary schools to use the PDHS track. The current restriction of having only four lanes also limits the range of events that can take place, often leading to slower-paced activities.
- The current state of jumping pits, runways, and throwing space (shot put, discus) are in poor shape, and need to be addressed.
- The current dirt/stone track is not an ideal surface for a secondary school track. The track requires constant maintenance, which becomes especially challenging after rainfall. Footprints tend to solidify into the surface when it has been walked on while wet, exacerbating the issue. This creates an uneven surface that has be attended to before it can be safely used.
- With the growing community, an expanding number of community members are utilizing the track for walking. The acquisition of a new track would represent a remarkable opportunity to enhance the prominence of PDHS. The goal is to establish the school as a community hub, and the implementation of a modern facility would help maintain PDHS as a desired recreational location for the town.
- The track is immensely important to the staff and students of PDHS. It is used for physical education classes, fitness classes, Relay for Life, extra-curricular activities, and community use. The current state and format of the track does not reflect the true potential of the academic and recreational use.
- Appendix A provides some visual depictions of the current track.

### **The Concept**

A current proposal would involve the redevelopment of the existing track and amenities including:

- Upgrading the current 4-lane track to a 6-lane synthetic track which would conform to International Amateur Athletic Federation (IAAF) and the Ontario Federation of School Athletic Associations (OFSAA) dimensions and lining
- Conversion of current grass field into artificial turf
- Development of lining for the following:
  - CFL Football
  - Full-size soccer

- Field hockey
- Cross field soccer
- Development of a high jump apron
- Construction of a long jump and triple jump facility
- New scoreboard
- LED Lighting for sports field
- Spectator seating for a capacity of 200
- Appendix B depicts an initial concept design

A new track and field could also be a magnet for students who may be deciding where to attend high school, creating a potential increase in Grand Erie's market share of students. An expanded facility can offer more elective programs, increase participation in various clubs, and potentially result in athletic teams becoming more competitive.

Based on the initial concept above, an estimate of \$3,000,000 has been provided to the facilities department for project. This includes:

- Site preparation
- Site servicing
- Track and field components
  - Turf
  - Drainage system
  - Center field logo
  - Endzone lettering
  - 6 land asphalt and synthetic surfacing
  - High jump, long jump and triple jump features
  - Scoreboard
  - Aluminum bleachers
  - Football uprights, soccer goalposts and field hockey nets
- Design
- Landscaping
- Permits

### **Next Steps:**

Capital Related Fundraising Policy (BU-03) states that "Grand Erie supports, facilitates, and encourages the development of authentic, mutually beneficial relationships between schools and the larger community, including business and non-business sectors, with regard for the legitimate needs of all parties involved."

Senior Administration has assessed the requirements of the policy's viability review with the facilities department and recommends that a fundraising campaign move forward. School Administration, in collaboration with school council, will coordinate a fundraising campaign that will set a target of \$2,000,000 over a 12-month period beginning July 2023 and concluding June 2024.

As per the policy, Board of Trustees approval is required for all capital projects funded by donations above \$100,000 in a year. The fundraising plan would encompass the following details:

- That the board opens a separate bank account to hold all fundraised dollars
- That the school raises \$2,000,000 by June 30, 2024
- That 100% of the fundraising is held in the same bank account
- That Trustees are provided an update on the fundraising status in February 2024

The province recognizes that parents and communities may choose to support their schools through fundraising activities. These activities have the potential to enrich the experience of

students, but also help build a broader sense of community outside school hours. Funds can be raised for a particular school or on a board level – both have the potential to enhance parent engagement and contribute to a student's educational experience.

A successful \$2,000,000 fundraising campaign, in addition to a \$1,000,000 contribution from Grand Erie's School Condition Improvement grant would result in a \$3,000,000 project budget, a sufficient amount to construct the amenities mentioned in the concept section above.

A target construction commencement date of July 1, 2024 could be achieved if the targets in the fundraising plan are met.



# Re: Special Incidence Portion (SIP) Claim Funding

I am writing to you on behalf of the members of the Kawartha Pine Ridge District School Board (KPRDSB) Special Education Advisory Committee (SEAC) to request your consideration of an increase in the maximum per pupil SIP claim amount. Currently, the maximum per pupil funding received from the Ministry of Education is \$28,803.00, which, while very appreciated, amounts to approximately one quarter of the Education Worker salary and benefits costs to support our students with the highest needs. The remaining cost is funded through both the Special Education enveloped grants, as well as through the GSNs.

At KPRDSB, we strive to be very efficient with our resources, yet we continue to spend beyond the Special Education funding envelope by 6.7% in order to ensure that students' programming needs are met. Expenses related to supporting students continue to outpace the revenue provided, which includes the very labour-intensive SIP claims. We do not want to reduce services which some students need to be successful at school; therefore, our entire school system is put under strain because we are required to allocate revenues from other grants to meet our moral and legal obligations to students with special education needs.

We urge you and your team, Minister Lecce, to review the data which is being used to determine Special Education grants in order to assess the true costs of supporting students with special needs. Specifically, we are requesting that the maximum amount of SIP claim funding per pupil be increased to accurately reflect the costs of ensuring these students have full access to education.

We look forward to your response, and we thank you for your consideration.

The Special Education Advisory Committee (SEAC) of the Rainy River District School Board (RRDSB) would like to send this letter of support for the concerns expressed by the Avon Maitland, Near North, Greater Essex County, and Durham District School Boards regarding funding of the Special Incidence Portion (SIP).

Like other school boards in the province, the Rainy River District School Board SEAC were dismayed with this decision to claw back the promised increase to SIP claim funding, given that the costs of supporting a student with a SIP claim are significantly higher than the allocated amount. For RRDSB, the Ministry's SIP amount covers only a fraction of the true cost to support a student with significant learning needs, while the remaining amount must be covered through other Special Education and operational grants. Inadequate funding of Special Education is putting our most vulnerable children at risk as we look to cut the services that they need to be successful in order to manage costs. The expenses to support our students continue to outpace the revenue provided, and puts further strain on our systems when school boards must use funds from other areas to meet their statutory commitment to children accessing Special Education services.

We urge the Minister to consider the true costs associated with SIP claims to support our students and increase funding accordingly. We also request that the Special Education funding model be revised to accurately reflect the increasing and more complex needs of students with special needs.

At the May 23, 2023 Board Meeting the following Notice of Motion was ratified unanimously by the Brant Haldimand Norfolk Catholic District School Board, Board of Trustees:

"THAT the Brant Haldimand Norfolk Catholic District School Board (BHNCDSB) rescind the custodial partnership with the Grand Erie District School Board (GEDSB) at Notre Dame Catholic Elementary School in Brantford at the end of the term of the agreement, Feb. 2024."

This is not an arbitrary decision as this has been a concern of the Board over a number of years as parent and staff complaints have been consistently coming to staff and trustees during that time. Our senior staff have been aware of our concerns and discussed this issue on many occasions with senior staff at the GEDSB. Both Directors of Education have also been made aware and have been involved in the discussions.

I have personally been given tours of the school on several occasions and each time have noted that the standard that we hold our custodial and maintenance staff at the BHNCDSB is not the same as the GFDSB.

We are aware that the GEDSB has made efforts to correct this issue and although some improvement has been noted, we continue to receive complaints and therefore feel the need to end the partnership that we have with the GEDSB. We have faith that our staff will be able to work with the GEDSB staff to come to a new arrangement where our custodial staff can clean both schools or at the very least our area.
