### Principal's Message

Field trips and out of classroom experiences are valuable learning experiences for our students. Think back to your own elementary school experience. What do you remember? I remember the sports activities and the field trips I attended! Those things were what made an impression on me and were long lasting!

At Central, we try hard to find inexpensive and educationally valuable activities for all students to attend. This year our younger students have gone apple picking to examine the changes that come with fall and learn a bit about agriculture in Ontario. Our grade 2/3 (and soon our 6/7 students) attended Swim to Survive training where students learn how to survive if they should fall into a body of water. And our grade 4-8 students will be attending an amazing end-of-year trip to Toronto where they will get to learn about underwater creatures at the Aquarium, take a drama lesson with Second City, learn about our amazing engineering accomplishments at the CN Tower, and learn a bit of Toronto History on a walking tour. We have had and will continue to have many other exciting out-of-classroom experiences during the 2014-15 school year.

Many parents wonder how we pick a field trip venue. There is much to consider. The first thing we must consider is the value of the learning experience, and the safety of our students. We must be able to show to parents and the Board of Education that the purpose of the trip is educational. This is the first "lens" we use when deciding on a school trip. Our next consideration is cost, as we always want all students to be able to attend any trip that we provide. Our school budget does not provide specific trip fund-ing—and we often use fundraising dollars to support these trips. We try to support all families with this fundraising money in order to be fair and equitable for all. For example, for our Grade 4-8 trip, our fundraising dollars are paying half of the cost of the trip. In other cases, we use the money to pay for the buses, and then students pay the entry fee. Sometimes teachers are able to secure

funding for entry fees through corporate donations, grants etc. and the trip can be offered to students for without any payment required from families.

We greatly appreciate the efforts our families make to financially support these kinds of trips when asked. We recognize that this expense is an extra, and want to assure you that we try our best to make the trip valuable in both the money spent, and the time required to plan and execute each class trip. A special thanks goes out from me to the teachers and Ms. Guest. They spend a great deal of time, behind the scenes, sourcing funding, getting approval from the Board, and collecting and managing the forms and payment that comes in. Thanks to you as parents for being quick to submit permission forms and payment, as this makes their jobs with this so much easier!

Looking forward to some great trips as the summer approaches!

## Parents Ask.... What are Math Manipulatives?

This year, our school has been focusing on the use of math manipulatives to support student understanding in mathematics. What are they?



Math manipulatives are any tools that students and teachers use

to help them to SEE how the math works. As parents, we probably learned how to calculate math with pencil and paper, but didn't always get to see WHY it worked.

Classes have a math cart with a wide variety of manipulatives available. These might be coins, counters, bead chains, 2D and 3D shapes, alegebra tiles or other things. "Found" items like bread bag ties and macaroni can even be used as to help students visualize how to add and subtract etc.

#### Help Your Children Be Cavity-Free

As a parent, you teach your children many things. You can help your children be cavity free by teaching them how to care for their teeth and gums. Here are some ideas:

- Teeth should be brushed 2 times each day for 2 minutes each time. Brush in the morning and at bedtime.
- The toothbrush should be child-sized with soft bristles. Use a pea-sized amount of fluoride toothpaste.
- Replace the toothbrush every 3 months. Replace the toothbrush more often if your child has been sick.
- Floss your child's teeth once a day.
- Eat healthy foods. Limit sticky and sweet snacks. The best time to eat sweet foods is with a meal. Avoid sipping sweetened drinks for long periods of time.
- Visit your dentist at least once a year. It is suggested that children start to see a dentist around age 1 so that any problems are found early.
