DREAM provides academic financial support to reduce the barriers of attending post-secondary school for secondary students who participate in their mentorship program around the areas of Self-Awareness, Community Awareness, Social Awareness and Post-Secondary Readiness. It provides a variety of programs and services to students and members of the community; a resource centre for youth, tutoring workshops and a global awareness speaker's series. In grade 11 students who participate in the Global Literacy Program travel to Ek Balam, Mexico to understand local and global issues in a different context.

The community uses the facilities for a variety of reasons: events, performances, athletics, social gatherings, meetings etc. As a result, the community supports many of the school's initiatives financially, with donations or through attendance at events. For example, there are over 100 employers who participate in our Co-op program and 75 individuals, companies or clubs and organizations that support our students through bursaries and scholarships at the school. We have used the Community Partners Incentive Program (CPIP) to help renovate aspects of the school. Comment: DSS has 20 security cameras that operate in the most "at risk" areas of the school. School and board staff works diligently to keep the school clean and physically safe. The technical education shops and science labs are constantly monitored for safety compliance. Teachers in all classes review the necessary safety procedures and processes specific to their classes with all students. Teachers and students are trained in CPR and First Aid. We have a great relationship with our OPP Community Relations Officer, who is visible and is available for students to talk to. The school has proper procedures and protocols for lockdown and fire drills.

Comment: DSS has an excellent school culture for allowing students to feel safe and secure. Expectations are transparent and consistently reviewed with students. In addition, visible cues are present throughout the school and 20 security cameras are deployed in a variety of locations to enhance the sense of security in the school. Anti-bullying initiatives are on-going with the THINK Campaign and through guest speakers, announcements and assemblies. Teachers are caring and receptive. They know the student body well and listen to their concerns and address issues immediately. Programs like See It, Text It, Safe Talk and ASIST and Talking Locker help students report and address their concerns in a confidential manner. School Climate Surveys are conducted to gather data on student's opinions of school safety. Student groups, like the Dignity and Ally Groups give student input to school issues.

The proximity of these businesses provides our students with options for lunch and snacks. Also local restaurants, school supply stores, hardware stores, automotive supply stores, and sports stores benefit from school business. Other local businesses are frequented by staff, students. As well, visitors to the school for sporting or social events spend their money locally. These businesses also provide part-time employment opportunities for the students after school and on weekends. This working relationship ensures that money stays in the local community.	Yes X	No □

### D. Other Value to the Local Economy?

Students who attend Dunnville Secondary School stay in their community, gain part-time employment and spend their money locally. They are not transported out of their community to help support another community. They complete volunteer work, participate in town improvement projects and take active roles in community fundraising projects that benefit the Town of Dunnville. The school supports the local economy whenever possible.

The business community believe that Dunnville is at the point of revitalizing their economy with new businesses coming to town and plans to increase tourism through a re-development of the Farmer's Market, and old arena property as well as the waterfront parks. Having a local secondary school present in town is paramount to helping revitalize the town.
